# 109th AIR CONTROL SQUADRON



#### MISSION

The mission of the 109th is "To provide reliable and secure command, control, communications, computer, and intelligence anytime, anywhere." This means that this unit provides higher headquarters with a real-time air picture for both offensive and defensive operations. This air picture is critical to battle management activities and to the war fighters' decision-making process. The 109th ACS supplies this air picture by utilizing long-range surveillance radar—coupled with a robust suite of HF, VHF, UHF radios complimented with satellite and microwave communications capabilities. The squadron operates and maintains this equipment that included the tactical data links and voice communications necessary for the Ground Theater Air Control System (GTACS). This includes integration capabilities with Air Force airborne and ground units, Army missile units, Marine ground units, and Navy vessels and aircraft.

The 109th Air Control Squadron is a fully deployable unit, able to position highly proficient personnel and specialized equipment virtually anywhere around the world. This capability makes the 109th an important component of our National Defense. On arrival, the 109th is able to quickly set up, establish a real time air picture, provide communications, power, and support all functions necessary as a self-sustaining unit.

## **OPERATIONS**

The unit began the year supporting operation "Southern Watch" in Kuwait. In April, unit members received valuable training and experience with a "COMMEX" designed to deploy and exercise long haul communications. Radar personnel were utilized for their technical expertise in the support of ongoing Drug interdiction programs. Additional training activities included: Equipment and Defense Messaging System (DMS) training, AWACS familiarization and home station training. Personnel participated in exercises and training in Italy, Germany, Poland, Georgia, Florida and Nevada just to name a few.

Special recognition was received from the 729th ACS at Hill AFB to some members of the 109th for their volunteer assistance and technical expertise during a critical time. The squadron's reputation of excellence came through once again as the unit deployed to Wendover, Utah in support of "Roving Sands 2003." Roving Sands is a unique large-scale joint theater air and missile defense exercise. It provides distinctive training opportunities to participants in Joint Theater Air and Missile Defense (JTAMD) as well as Joint Tactical Air Operations (JTAO). The exercise encompassed the execution of a ground campaign through modeling and simulation to provide adequate ground activity during which the 109<sup>th</sup> accomplished all training objectives. In the exercise, the unit demonstrated the ability to deploy ACS equipment and support a robust Theater architecture. The exercise provided training and familiarization in command and control of an Integrated Air Defense system (IADS) in a joint services environment and conventional war scenario. Joint assets were integrated into theater architecture through accurate tracking, surveillance, identification, and control of airborne assets in the assigned area of responsibility as well as practice of battle management tactics, techniques and procedures.

In October 2003 members of the 109th were mobilized in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. They deployed to two separate locations, Baghdad and Kirkuk, Iraq. Their mission was to provide Air Control, Surveillance, and Identification of aircraft for the entire Iraqi theater. During the deployment, they accomplished a seamless move of equipment and control capability from Baghdad to Balad; the first ever redeployment of a Control and

Reporting Center while in a combat environment. The Kirkuk detachment also accomplished several "firsts" as they completed the first ever field repainting of the TPS-75 radar. They were able to provide electronics expertise and parts to an Army fire finder radar unit that was a critical piece in the overall base protection and defense scheme. After seven months in theater, all personnel were redeployed back to Utah in June 2004.

The 109th ACS members who were not deployed, stayed busy as they supported the 729th Air Control Squadron in performing an evaluation of radar system capabilities. In June, unit members received valuable training and experience as they supported the Patriot 04 exercise. Members also deployed to Poznan, Poland to support NATO Air Meet, where they controlled over 90 aircraft from 15 different countries.

18 November 2010 SALT LAKE CITY, Utah - Approximately 70 Airmen of the Utah Air National Guard's 109th Air Control Squadron will return to Utah Thursday, Nov. 18, from support of the Global War on Terrorism. This has been the Squadron's fifth mobilization in ten years. The 109th Air Control Squadron is a worldwide-deployable, battle-management platform. They provide radar surveillance, identification and command and control of Coalition aircraft for combatant commanders. The unit is manned by Maintenance, Operations, and Combat Support personnel providing 24/7 coverage of the battlefield and is equipped to deploy to austere remote locations. The fact that the 109th Air Control Squadron is one of only a handful of Air Control Squadrons in the Air Force keeps them busy in the Global War on Terrorism. The Squadron's first activation was in 2000, when members deployed to Kuwait in support of Operation Southern Watch. In the days following Sept 11,2001, the unit was mobilized again for almost a year for Operation Noble Eagle. They provided radar coverage and protection over the Western United States and for the 2002 Winter Olympic Games. In 2003 the unit was again called to active duty and deployed over 60 members to three locations in Iraq for seven months in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. In September 2007 the unit deployed to southwest Asia for several months in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. The 109th Air Control Squadron's current activation was in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. The squadron members supported the ground forces in the field by coordinating combat air support for troops in contact in Afghanistan. In addition to providing command and control in Afghanistan, the deployed 109th Air Control Squadron Airmen worked closely with Army Air Defense Units to provide persistent air defense of the Persian Gulf. Maintenance personnel played an indispensable role in the 109th Air Control Squadron's mission by maintaining the \$30 million facility and equipment. Absolutely none of the Operations would be possible without the warriors working in Materiel Control, Ground Radio, Theater Deployable Communications, Aerospace Ground Equipment, Maintenance Operations Center, and Radar. The outstanding Airmen working in these sections performed incredible feats to ensure the 109th maintained a 100% Operational rate.
