OPERATIONS

In 2001, the 611 ACS began a four-year transition to the Alaska Air National Guard. On 1 Oct 2004, the 611 ACS was officially inactivated and the 176 ACS was ceremonially recognized.

The facility, called a Region Air Operations Center is part of the Alaskan North American Aerospace Defense Command Region. The guard members who staff it work closely with active-duty members of the Alaskan North American Aerospace Defense Command Region, the 11th Air Force and a Canadian Forces Air Command detachment to detect and intercept any intrusion into U.S. or Canadian airspace.

Approximately 150 Alaska Air National Guardsmen assigned to the 176th Air Control Squadron performed a daily air sovereignty mission in support of the Alaskan Regional Air Operations Center on Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson. Created to defend against potential bomber attacks from now-former Cold War foes, the Air Control Squadron, today, keeps tabs not only on continued probing by the Russians, it also identifies and directs response to incursions of other unknown aircraft into Alaska airspace. In 2011, the Air Control Squadron was credited with 13 intercepts and 24 aircraft operations.

The 176th Air Control Squadron maintains the highest NORAD mission readiness status and is continually recognized for its outstanding performance. In February 2011, the 176th Air Control Squadron received a rating of "Mission Ready," the highest rating available. Also noteworthy in 2011, the 176 ACS participated in an exercise called Vigilant Eagle. Two of its members were deployed to Russia for this unique Joint-NORAD exercise.
