#### **EMBLEM**

Per bend sinister Azure and Argent (Gray) overall a lightning bolt bend sinisterwise Or, and in dexter chief two stylized aircraft bend sinisterwise pointed up Argent; issuant from sinister

base the silhouette of a pedestal supporting an equestrian figure with arm raised holding a saber all of the first, all within a diminished border Or. Attached below the shield, a White scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "192D OPERATIONS GROUP" in Blue letters. SIGNIFICANCE: Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The emblem relates to the historical significance of the unit. On a background of blue and gray to represent aerospace, the theater of operations and Virginia heritage, two aircraft depict the dual state and federal role. The lightning bolt indicates speed, force and the ability to accomplish the mission. The horse and rider facing the theater of operations with sword raised symbolize readiness. The rider on the pedestal indicates the strong foundation on which the unit is built, and the monument alludes to the unit's city of origin.
