The largest squadron in the Group is the CAM Squadron which has the total responsibility for maintaining the eight aircraft in our inventory. The Squadron is comprised of four units: staff, organizational maintenance, field maintenance, and avionics. Services provided by these functions include: administration, quality control, training, maintenance control of workload and data, material, flight line and hangar maintenance, support equipment, fabrication work, structural repairs, corrosion control, survival equipment, inspection, propulsion, aircraft systems, as well as communications and navigations equipment both on-board and ground radio. Total membership in the CAM Squadron is 332 enlisted and seven officers. The Squadron also occupies three buildings

in the complex: #71, the Corrosion Control Hangar; #74, the Engine/Propeller/Non-Destructive Inspection Shop; and #75, the primary maintenance hangar.
