EMBLEM

The 302d Aircraft Maintenance Squadron emblem consists of three distinctive elements, each symbolizing a unique aspect of our mission and heritage. The emblem consists of an MC scarlet and Air Force yellow Phoenix rising in front of an ultramarine blue and white capped mountains, set against the backdrop of a light blue sky and black cog border. The scrolls are white with black letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The Phoenix symbolizes renewal and resurrection, it obtains a new brighter, stronger life by arising from the ashes of its predecessors.
