EMBLEM



Argent, throughout a spade as a suit of playing cards Sable surmounted by a wolf's head in tran aspect of the First detailed Smoke Gray eye and langued Gules armed Or, all within a diminished bordure Azure. Attached above the disc a White scroll edged with a narrow Blue border inscribed "302D SECURITY FORCES SQ" in Blue letters. Attached below the disc a White scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "SI VAS PACEM PARA BELLUM" in Blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The Northern Rocky Mountain wolf's head pertains to the fierce determination and survival instincts of the unit. The spade is the squadron's symbol for quick response and attack capabilities. (Approved, 14 Jul 2000)





On a disc Argent, a spade from a deck of playing cards point upwards Sable, surmounted by a wolf's head caboshed of the first, detailed Gris (Smoke Gray), eyed and langued Gules, teeth Or, all within a diminished bordure Ultramarine Blue. Attached above the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "302D SECURITY FORCES SQ" in Blue letters. Attached below the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "SI VAS PACEM PARA BELLUM" in Blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The wolf's head symbolizes the fierce determination and loyalty of the unit. The spade represents the Squadron's quick response and attack capabilities.
