Activated in Italy as a Bombardment wing in Dec 1943, the 304th participated in the strategic Bombardment of enemy occupied Europe. Targets included harbors, marshalling yards, airdromes, bridges, industrial areas, and troop concentrations in Italy, Austria, Germany, Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia, and Greece. In May 1944, some subordinate units began an intensive bombing campaign against enemy oil resources, which included refineries at Ploesti, Rumania, and oil and storage plants in Austria, Germany, and Hungary. During Jul and Aug 1944, subordinate units also prepared for and supported the invasion of southern France. While active in the Reserve in California, 1947-1949, the 304th was redesignated as a division.
