OPERATIONS

Trained in various states for overseas bombardment missions, Mar-Sep 1942.

Activated 1 Mar. 42 at Salt Lake City AB, Utah. Training at this base and from 11 Jun. 42, at Geiger Fd, Wash. Intensive training at Muroc Lake AB, Cal. from 29 Jun. to 20 Aug. 42.

Sailed on Queen Mary 5 Sep. 42 and disembarked Greenock on 12 Sep. 42. Air echelon assembled at Syracuse, NY. And spent six weeks in advanced flight training. Received new B-17F and left for UK Oct. 42, via Presque Isle, and Gander to Prestwick.

Entered combat over occupied Europe on 17 Nov. On 27 Jan 1943, the group participated in the Eighth Air Force's first raid on Germany. It attacked naval targets, factories, harbors, marshalling yards, and industrial targets in Germany, France, Belgium, the Netherlands, and Norway in 1943 and 1944.

The group earned two Distinguished Unit Citations, one for a 4 Apr 1943 mission to Paris, France, and another for an 11 Jan 1944 raid on aircraft factories in central Germany. In Feb 1944, the group participated in the "Big Week" raids against the German aircraft industry.

Later in 1944, it flew interdiction and air support sorties in addition to strategic bombing missions. In preparation for the Allied invasion of Normandy in Jun 1944, the 305th attacked V-weapon sites, airfields, and repair shops. On D-day, the group bombed enemy strongholds in the battle area. In Jul 1944, it struck enemy positions at St. Lo for an Allied offensive from Normandy into central France.

The group bombed German antiaircraft batteries in Sep 1944 to cover the Allied airborne invasion of the Netherlands. In Dec 1944 and Jan 1945, it participated in the Battle of the Bulge by striking enemy positions in the Ardennes Forest. The group also supported the Allied airborne assault across the Rhine River in Mar 1945. It sometimes flew night missions.

On 25 Apr, the group flew its final combat mission of World War II. After the war, it participated in the initial American occupation of Europe.

The group also conducted photographic mapping missions over Europe and North Africa.

Between 20-27 Jul. 45 Group moved St. Trond, Belgium, where it conducted photo-mapping flights (Project "Casey Jones") over Europe and North Africa. On 15 Dec. 45 moved to Lechfeld, Germany (which it had bombed 18 Mar. 44) to continue photographic work. Gradually run down during 1946, with inactivation of 364BS on 1 Jul. 46. 423BS of 306BG attached to Group after this date but by end of Oct. 46 Group had ceased all operations. Officially inactivated 25 Dec. 46. On the Continent came under 9AF and on 15 Nov 45 under USAFE. Activated in 1951 as SAC B-29 unit and as 305BW converted to B-47s in 1953. Later became one of USAFs two B-58 units.

Not operational from 16 Oct-25 Dec 1946.

During two periods of activation, between Jul 1947 and Sep 1948 and between Jan 1951 and Jun 1952, the group was manned only from 2 Jan-9 Feb 1951.

Between Sep 1991 and Oct 1993, the group managed air refueling squadrons, but they did not fly between 1 Jul and 15 Oct 1993.

Commenced transport operations in 1994 and resumed tanker missions in 1995.

Managed strategic airlift, airdrop, and air refueling assets of the 305 Air Mobility Wing.

Supported combat operations in Afghanistan (2001-) and Iraq (2003-) and humanitarian airlifts for victims of natural disasters.
