EMBLEM

On a disc as globe Azure, gridlined Argent, land masses Or, overall a fox head affronté Gules, fimbriated and detailed of the second, all within a narrow border Red. Attached below the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Red border and inscribed "315 ALCF" in Red letters. Attached above the disc, a White scroll edged with a narrow Red border and inscribed "SWAMP FOX" in Red letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The globe signifies the world-wide capabilities of the unit. The fox denotes the Flight's quick-thinking and adaptability to changing mission requirements. The fox is a reminder that we must utilize all of our resources in order to accomplish the mission. (Approved, 2 Apr 2013)
