EMBLEM



315 Logistics Readiness Squadron emblem: On a disc Azure, an owl Proper volant, garnished Sable, beak and talons Or, between in chief a key ward to dexter bow to base Argent (Silver Gray), below arcing to base five mullets of the third; all within a narrow border of the same. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "CLAVIS EST VICTORIA" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and

inscribed "315 LRS" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE.** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The owl is representative of the Greek goddess Athena and her wisdom, intelligence and military strategy. Her owl is in attack position to represent ever-readiness, swiftness and precision in planning and execution of all missions. The skeleton key is significant to the unit motto, "CLAVIS EST VICTORIA," which translates to "KEY TO VICTORY." it represents the ability of the unit to unlock many different locks, fit in, adapt, and exceed any challenge, mission and location. The five stars in base symbolize the squadron's five units and their functions: Supply, Logistics Plans, Fuels, Vehicle Maintenance and Operations. (Approved, 16 Sep 2020)
