OPERATIONS

328th Aero Squadron stands pre-eminent as the most widely known squadron in the Air Service. It was organized November 4th, 1917, under the command of Capt. Lester D. Gardner, for the purpose of handling specially selected men for advanced training at the various factories, institutions, etc. Approximately six thousand men passed through this organization, being assigned to detachments in eighty-four different parts of the United States.

The 328th Aero Squadron was represented at the most noted institutions of learning in the country, among which they be mentioned the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, the Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pratt Institute at Brooklyn, N. Y., Dunwoody Institute, Minneapolis, Minn., David Rankin School of Mechanical Arts, St. Louis, Mo., A large majority of these men later received com-missions.

On December 21st, 1917, the command was transferred by Capt. Gardner to 1st Lieut, Eban Stanley, who, on February 11th, 1918, was succeeded by its present commander, 1st Lieut. Irving H. Patterson.

Constituted in the Organized Reserve on 24 June 1921 as the 328th Squadron (Observation), assigned to the 103rd Division, and allotted to the Eighth Corps Area. Initiated on 29 November 1921 at Denver, CO. Redesignated as the 328th Observation Squadron on 25 January 1923. Relieved on 21 February 1929 from assignment to the 103rd Division. Assigned on 1 October 1933 to the 338th Observation Group (XVIII Corps). Relocated on 18 November 1936 to Brooks

Field, TX. Consolidated on 21 November 1936 with the 328th Aero Squadron (a WWI unit organized on 10 December 1917 at Kelly Field, TX,; demobilized in August 1919 at Kelly Field, TX; reconstituted on 21 November 1936). Withdrawn from allotment to the Organized Reserve on 1 January 1938 and allotted to the Regular Army as a RAI unit. Typically conducted Inactive Training Period meetings at the Kitteridge Building in Denver. Conducted summer training at various locations to include Biggs Field, TX, Brooks Field, TX, Dodd Field, TX, Love Field, TX, and Hensley Field, TX. Disbanded on 31 May 1942.
