EMBLEM



3711th Basic Military Training Squadron emblem

329th Training Squadron emblem: On a blue globe outlined and grided gray a white star giving off nine yellow radiations, detailed brown, originating at points and between points and extending throughout globe, except between bass points where star is surmounted by a red flame, outlined yellow, of a yellow torch, detailed and shaded brown, that is in pale to base of globe. Emblem between two white scrolls bordered red with lower scroll inscribed in red capital letters. The emblem is symbolic of the squadron and its mission. The white star on the blue background represents the Air Force and alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. The flaming torch of knowledge symbolizes the unit's training mission. The radiations from the star refer to the squadron's high principle in its mission, to prepare newly enlisted Air Force men and send the best-trained airmen to bases throughout the world. The emblem bears the squadron colors, red and white and the Air Force colors, golden yellow and ultramarine blue. (Approved, 12 Jan 1965)
