332nd Expeditionary Security Forces Squadron emblem

332nd Expeditionary Security Forces Squadron emblem: On a disc parted per bend sinister Azure and Vert, a stylized base security zone with three blocked edges in dexter chief and sinister base Argent, surmounted by an American Bald eagle, wings extended Proper, perched upon a globe of the first, gridlined and fimbriated Sable charged with a lightning flash Or. Attached above the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "EYES OF THE EAGLE ARE ON YOU" in Blue letters. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Blue border

and inscribed "332D EXP SECURITY FORCES SQ" in Blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE**: Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The stylized white block represents a security perimeter which the unit will protect and defend. The eagle represents the unit's force support, air dominance, power, and strength in its role in the United States Air Force. Clutching the globe with its talons also signifies dominance and control over world air power. The lightning flash symbolizes the unit's ability to strike worldwide anywhere with intelligence and resolve. (Approved, 21 Mar 2011)
