The 341 Missile Security Forces Squadron ensures robust strategic nuclear deterrence as the largest security forces unit in the 341 Security Forces Group. It maintains security forces on 24-hour alert throughout a 13,800-square mile missile complex. It supports the United States Strategic Command's war-fighting requirements by providing security for 15 missile alert facilities commanding 150 intercontinental ballistic missiles constantly ready to launch against targets directed by the President.

EMBLEM



On a blue disc, a yellow sun issuing from dexter base radiating to chief, the rays surmounted by a demi-eagle proper issuing from sinister and emitting from its open mouth two scarlet lightning flashes in dexter chief all below a white cloud issuing from sinister chief; overall in base a green stylized mountain range; all within a narrow yellow border. Attached below the disc a blue scroll edged with a narrow yellow border. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater for Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The eagle refers to the security police mission. The lightning bolts reflect the quick response of security elements to invisible threats symbolized by the clouds. The mountains reflect the unit's home state of Montana. (Approved, 23 Sep 1988)
