EMBLEM

On a disc Vert, A torch Or enflamed Gules, grasped by a gauntlet Agent (Silver Gray), detailed with a compass star of the same, and between six lighting bolts of the second radiating to dexter and sinister, all within a narrow border Blue. Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The green background symbolizes the wisdom and the mission of ground and air to ground combat skills training. The lightning bolts represent the abilities of the squadron in the execution of the mission in six major Air Force specialties. The torch represents knowledge and training.
