EMBLEM



349 USAF Clinic emblem: On a blue disc, a garnet red snake entwined on a gold brown staff winged yellow; all within a narrow yellow border. Attached above the disc a silver gray scroll edged with a narrow yellow border. Attached below the disc a silver gray scroll edged with a narrow yellow border and inscribed EXCELLENCE IN MEDICINE in yellow letters. Significance Blue and yellow are the colors of the Air Force. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater for Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The staff of Aesculapius, mythological god of medicine, refers to the Medical mission. The red snake epitomizes the lifeblood preserved by the Clinic. The unit is known as

the Golden Gate Wing, symbolized by the wings on the staff. Approved, 22 Sep 1988

The wooden staff entwined with a snake represents Aesculapius, the mythical Greco-Roman god of medicine, who carried a knotty wooden staff entwined with a snake. The United States Air Force Medical Service and other medical groups the world over also use this staff to identify the medical profession. The color of the snake is red and staff is brown. The wings are representative of our global mission. The primary mission of the 349th Air Mobility Wing is in support of Rapid Global Mobility.

The primary colors are Ultramarine Blue and Air Force Yellow, the official Air Force colors. Blue represents the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations, and yellow represents the sun and symbolizes the excellence expected of all Airmen. Red represents the blood of life, which medical personnel swear to protect. Brown represents the earth and the land we are serving to defend. Gray represents the humility required of all Air Force members.
