## **EMBLEM**







On a Blue globe gridlined Gray enveloped by a Red band all within a narrow Black border, two aerodynamic symbols in horizontal flight, engaged in air refueling, the topmost symbol and connector Gray, the lower symbol Black all between a Yellow sunburst in the top of the disc to dexter, and a Yellow lightning bolt issuing from base in sinister. (Approved, 11 Jan 1977, modified in 1994; replaced emblem approved, 24 May 1957)

## **OPERATIONS**

Combat in ETO, 25 Jun 1943–20 Apr 1945. Bombardment training, 1956–1966.

Worldwide strategic reconnaissance, 1966–1976. Created by a renumbering of the 4028th SRS

in June 1966, the 349th SRS conducted training in the U-2C, U-2F and (from September 1968) U-2R models. It also flew domestic reconnaissance missions in support of various US government agencies. From 1972, it was allocated responsibility for the operational trials of the Advanced Location and Strike Systems (ALSS), and deployed five U-2C to the UK for this purpose in 1975. When U-2 operations were moved to Beale AFB in July 1976, the 349th squadron number transferred with the 100th wing designation to the KC-135Q operation already there.

Air refueling in support of SR-71, 1976-1990.

8 October 1965 Lockheed U-2C, 56-6690, of the 349th Strategic Reconnaissance Squadron, 100th Strategic Reconnaissance Wing, develops technical problems while on high-altitude reconnaissance flight over North Vietnam, attempts to recover to base but crashes near Bien Hoa, South Vietnam. Pilot Maj. Leo J. Stewart ejects and survives. This is the only U.S. Air Force U-2 loss in theatre during the War in Southeast Asia.

Provided cargo and air refueling support to combat units in Southwest Asia, Aug 1990–Mar 1991.
