MISSION

354th Civil Engineer Squadron performs facility maintenance, repair, design and construction to water and wastewater treatment. Provides fire protection and military housing. Oversees base operability and survivability and supports worldwide mobility taskings. Ensures environmental requirements, prevention and conservation goals are achieved.

Eielson AFB covers 19,790 acres of land and has 1,476 family housing units, 522 dorm rooms, 715 buildings, and infrastructure worth over \$3.8B. Adding 16 remote sites, these numbers increase to 775 buildings and 67,217 acres of land. These facilities are constructed, maintained and operated under the direction of the 354th Civil Engineer Squadron. The squadron is divided into eight flights and has nearly 600 full time employees.

It operates a coal-fired heat and power plant, water plant and waste-water treatment plant. These facilities make the base independent of commercial utilities. The 354th CES is responsible for other municipal services including refuse collection, recycling, and fire prevention and protection. Additional responsibilities include management of multi-million dollar design and construction programs, energy conservation, environmental and natural resources programs, and bombing range operation and maintenance. Maintaining unit readiness for contingency taskings, supporting disaster preparedness programs and providing explosive ordnance disposal capabilities are also part of the mission of the 354th CES.

EMBLEM


On an AF golden-yellow disc, a white disc charged with a shield per bend brown and red; on the shield an AF golden-yellow bendlet between a draftsman's drawing of a sword (paper white, sword in black outlines) and a hand white, outlined black, grasping an AF golden-yellow sword; encircling the shield a red dragon holding in his claws a spade, right angle, pliers and hose nozzle, brown and AF golden-yellow; the dragon's teeth, wings, and eyeballs white, his mouth, spiny backbone and outline of eye brown; outlines and details black throughout. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The emblem is symbolic of the squadron's primary mission and relates to the motto. The drawing of the sword represents the "thought" which is developed in the engineering and drafting section. The working tools held in the dragon's claws indicate the fire department, shops, roads, and grounds. The dragon symbolizes the scope of the squadron's activities and completes the message of the motto, signifying that with these tools the squadron accomplishes its mission. (Approved, 17 Apr 58)
