Constituted in the Organized Reserve on 29 July 1921 as the 369th Squadron (Observation), assigned to the II Corps and allotted to the Second Corps Area. Initiated on 2 November 1921 at New Dorp, NY. The squadron's equipment was stationed at Miller Field, NY. Redesignated as the 369th Observation Squadron on 25 January 1923. Assigned on 31 March 1924 to the 325th Observation Group (II Corps). Relieved from assignment to the 325th Observation Group on 1 October 1933 and assigned to the 307th Observation Group. Consolidated on 27 November 1936 with the 369th Aero Squadron (Service) (a WWI unit organized in January 1918 at Waco Field, TX; demobilized in June 1919 at Mitchel Field, NY; reconstituted on 27 November 1936). Conducted summer training at Mitchel Field, NY. Designated mobilization station was Mitchel Field, NY. Status: Disbanded on 31 May 1942.
