EMBLEM

On a disc Celeste, a cloud bank Proper detailed Sable supporting a hammer and fire axe heads toward center braced with an engineer's ruler as a Torii gate Gules, overall in base a stylized bull enraged and charging Azure horned and eyed Argent, unguled of the third, all within a diminished border Black. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "374TH CIVIL ENGINEER SQUADRON" in Black letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The charging bull surrounded by clouds represents the Squadron's mission of charging forward, striving toward perfection using determination and might. The engineer's ruler is symbolic of planning and development. The hammer signifies construction. The fire axe alludes to protection and readiness in emergencies. The tools are configured into a Torii gate representing the unit's location.
