EMBLEM



On a disc Celeste, beneath in chief a polestar Argent, a cloud fesswise of the like, overall in saltire a lightning bolt bend sinisterwise Or and a sword bendwise point up Gris, grip Azure, pommel of the third, fimbriated and detailed Sable, all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "PARATUS SUSTENTARE" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "403D OPERATIONS SUPPORT SQ" in Yellow letters. SIGNIFICANCE: Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The polestar is representative of the North Star navigation marker used by aviators and the Squadron's representation in the 403d Wing. The cloud and the lightning bolt represent the weather reconnaissance mission that is supported by the men and women of the Squadron. The sword represents the tactical mission.
