**EMBLEM**



414<sup>th</sup> Bombardment Squadron, Heavy emblem: Over and through a light pastel blue disc, a small, caricatured, brown puppy with look of supplication on face, seated on the damaged, olive drab-camouflaged tail section of a B-17, proper, and clasp ing forepaws in prayer, all in front of a large white cloud formation, and emitting white speed lines to rear. (Approved, 24 Jun 1944)

414<sup>th</sup> Expeditionary Reconnaissance Squadron emblem: On an Ultramarine Blue disc, over a White cloud the tail section of a still flying but damaged Olive Drab B-17 bomber with a Brown dog in a prayerful sitting position on the rear stabilizer which is torn off exposing the inner structure Yellow, all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached below the disc, a Black scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "414TH EXPEDITIONARY RECON SQ" in Yellow letters. Attached above the disc, a Black scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "ALL AMERICAN" in Yellow letters. Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The emblem is the historic symbol for the Squadron and harkens to its rich heritage as a bomb unit in the Mediterranean Theater during WWII. The dog, symbolizing the trustworthy and duty-bound Squadron members, riding on the damaged B-17 tail speaks to a specific event in the unit's history. The B-17 "All American" suffered severe damage from a collision with a German aircraft; yet, under the skillful performance of its commander and crew, the crippled aircraft made it successfully back to base. This incident represented the courage and determination of the Squadron's crewmembers and serves as an inspiration for today's service members.
