**EMBLEM** 



On a disc per fess Azure, checky Sable and Argent, an eagle displayed head to dexter Or, tongue Gules, eye of the third, grasping in its dexter claw an arrow bendwise point to chief of the fourth, feathered Red, shafted Brown, and clutching a sword in its sinister claw, bendwise sinister, grip of the last, hilted of the second, and bladed point up White, in chief three flight symbols radiating of the last, all within a narrow border of the second. Attached above the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "INSTABILUS NOSTRI CLASSICUS" in Black letters. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "419<sup>TH</sup> SERVICES FLIGHT" in Black letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The checker-board background symbolizes the digital domain and tactical strategy used by the unit. The eagle represents loyalty and truth. The arrow signifies martial readiness, and the sword symbolizes military honor. The three air flight symbols represent generosity, nobility and strength. (Approved, 15 May 2006)
