EMBLEM

On a disc Azure, a griffin rampant wings elevated and addorsed Or, langued Gules, eyed and armed Sable, grasping in its dexter paw a sword Argent, hilt of the second enflamed of the third and grasping in its sinister paw a shield blazoned: Gules a hurt charged with a mullet Argent, all within a diminished bordure Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "423D AIR BASE SQUADRON" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "COMMITTED TO EXCELLENCE" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The griffin symbolizes strength, honor, loyalty and courage, an ever-alert guardian that embodies the Squadron's spirit. The shield signifies the unit's effort in protecting peace and freedom. The star denotes the unit's commitment to excellence. The flaming sword recalls the Squadron's lineage and commemorates the sacrifice, gallantry and courage of previous personnel during World War II.
