EMBLEM



The 434th Operations Support Squadron emblem consists of three distinctive elements, each symbolizing a unique aspect of the squadron. The emblem consists of a black eagle, crossed checkered racing flags, and three groups of stars, colored red, Air Force yellow and Air Force blue all portrayed on a gray background. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The gray field represents the maturity and reliability for which our unit has become known, contributing to our wing's being known as "The Unit of Choice". The noble eagle symbolizes the unit's global reach, vision and determination. The color black used in the eagle and borders portrays the power, sophistication and depth of the unit's widely diverse mission. Together, they construct the squadron name, the "Black Eagles". The crossed checkered racing flags illustrate the rich spirit of competition embraced by the three squadrons within the 434th Operations Group. The red, yellow and blue stars are grouped in a 4-3-4 pattern to represent our unit's numerical designation. The colors red and Air Force blue reflect the support of our sister squadrons, the

74th and 72d Air Refueling Squadrons, respectively. The Air Force yellow stars reflect the unit's global commitment.
