EMBLEM



439 Operations Support Squadron emblem: On a disc parted per pale wavy of three Gules and two Argent, an American bald eagle volant Proper, and to dexter side seven mullets Or, all within a narrow border of the same. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "EXCELLENCE IN SUPPORT" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "439TH OPERATIONS SUPPORT SQ" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The red, white and blue within the design alludes to patriotism, pride in country, service, Squadron and self. The eagle is our national symbol representing the strength and courage to continually fight for freedom and commitment to the nation's defense. The stars represent the passing down of information to shape the next generation. (Approved, 1 Aug 2005)
