# 448 SUPPLY CHAIN MANAGEMENT WING



#### MISSION

The 448 Combat Sustainment Wing, composed of four Combat Sustainment Groups 448 Combat Sustainment Group, 748th Combat Sustainment Group, 848th Combat Sustainment Group and 948th Combat Sustainment Group, performs supply chain management including acquisition, repair, storage, distribution, disposal, technical and engineering services for the OC-ALC's assigned aircraft commodities and engines (F100, F101, F110, F108, F118, J85, TF33, TF34, TF39, T56, helicopter' and missile engines). The wing supports all branches of the U.S. armed forces, as well as federal agencies and several foreign countries. It provides core program and contract support for managed engines and has Operational Safety, Suitability and Effectiveness responsibility for them. It oversees and executes the Supply Management Mission Area resources, as well as financial oversight and execution of the Supply Management Activity Group cost authority. The wing develops and maintains center policy and procedures for Weapon System

EMBLEM



448 Combat Sustainment Wing emblem

448 Supply Chain Management Wing emblem: Azure, a chevron Argent, overall a fess Or, with chain link border Silver Gray, in base a gear wheel of the like surmounted by a lightning flash of the third and in chief, on the chevron point, an aerial bomb point to base of the first, all within a diminished bordure Yellow. Attached below the shield, a White scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "448 SUPPLY CHAIN MANAGEMENT WING" in Blue letters. Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The chevron symbolizes aircraft, and the gear wheel and lightning flash represent the engines that power those aircraft. The fess signifies the mission, bordered by the chain links that stand for the supply chain to include acquisition, repair, storage, distribution, disposal and technical and engineering services. The bomb in chief recalls the original designation of the wing.

## **OPERATIONS**

Trained as a Reserve bombardment wing under supervision of the 2347th Air Force Reserve Training Center, 1949-1951.

Lost more than half of its personnel in the call-up of another wing in Aug 1950.

Ordered to active service in Mar 1951, but personnel used as fillers in other units.

Replaced the 8708th Pilot Training Wing in May 1955 and trained as a Reserve fighter-bomber wing until inactivated in 1957.
