# **EMBLEM**



459 Troop Carrier Wing, Medium emblem, On a shield azure an American eagle proper flying over clouds in the base argent between two parachutes, one in chief transporting an airman, one in base transporting supplies all of the last; In chief a canton argent charged with the Capitol dome of the second. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The eagle, flying above the clouds in a blue sky, relates to the Air Force mission. The two parachutes with supplies and airman signify the troop carrier mission. The canton, in the dexter chief, of the shield, is an heraldic symbol. It symbolizes an honorable addition to the significance of the emblem. The canton is charged with the Capitol dome and implies this unit is called the "Congressional Wing", and the motto is "In Honor of Congress." (Approved, 1956)

Azure, in chief an arched banner doubled checky Sable and Or fimbriated Argent surmounted in base by a dexter gauntlet bendwise sinister thumb down Proper grasping a bomb palewise nose to base Gules fimbriated and garnished White; all within a diminished bordure Yellow. Attached below the shield a White scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed 459th AIRLIFT WING in Blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE**: Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The gauntlet grasping a bomb, suggests the unit's past history as a bomb group. It also reflects its current airlift functions which offer a strong and solid support to the Air Force global mission. The checky banner was used by the unit's predecessor unit as a tail marking. It is used on the Wing's aircraft today to reflect the Wing's World War II history and lineage. (Approved, 24 Jun 1996)

## **MOTTO**

### **OPERATIONS**

Trained in the Reserve for troop carrier and airlift operations. Supported airlift requirements of the Tactical Air Command, 1955 to Jul 1966 and from Jun 1971 to Dec 1974, and of Military Airlift Command from Jul 1966 to Jun 1971 and again from Dec 1974 to June 1992.

In late 1977 began to rotate elements to Panama to fly airlift missions in support of Southern Command. Participated in contingency operations in Grenada, 1983.

Provided airlift support to the fire fighters in Yellowstone National Park and to Armenian humanitarian relief effort. 1988

C-141 crew from 459 AW airlifted planeload of medical supplies to La Paz, Bolivia, to provide humanitarian assistance. 1998

The wing also provided aeromedical evacuation service and air transportation for deployment of other units. Supported operations in ENDURING FREEDOM and IRAQI FREEDOM with intertheater airlift, Oct 2001- Sep 2003.
