OPERATIONS

The 482d Fighter Interceptor Squadron, having been constituted on 12 October 1943, and activated on 1 November 1943 at March Army Air Field, California, served as a Replacement Training Unit (RTU) during World War II. Its mission was to train replacement pilots for fighter units overseas. The pilots assigned to the squadron as trainees already had received their first and second phase training in combat aircraft. The 482d provided the third phase of training in twin-engine P-38 fighters. The trainees received from 80 to 100 hours of flight training consisting of close formation flying, combat tactics, aerial gunnery, and intelligence training to prepare them for combat duty. The squadron's assignment as a Replacement Training Unit was short lived. On 31 March 1944, five months after activation, the unit was disbanded at Moses Lake Air Field, Washington, and its personnel were reassigned to the 431st AAF Base Unit.
