EMBLEM



On a disc Or, a four-bladed aircraft propeller per cross Silver Gray, shaded Sable, entwined on the palewise blades by a serpent Gules, winged to sinister Argent detailed of the third, within an orle of six mullets gyronny Argent and Azure; all within a narrow bordure of the fourth. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Red border and inscribed "2D AMDS" in Red letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Red border and inscribed "KEEPS 'EM FLYING" in Red letters. Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The central charge combines two traditional symbols for flight (propeller) and medicine (an entwined serpent) to refer to the primary mission of the 2d

Aerospace Medicine Squadron. The six stars refer to the six flights which comprise the Squadron. (Approved, 17 Feb 1999)
