EMBLEM

The shield's shape was later changed to conform to the U.S. Air Force standard, A second modification changed the background color on the shield from blue to black. The emblem symbolizes its primary mission. The shield signifies protection while its colors represent the sky. The outline of Europe indicates the wing's wide area of responsibility and the stars represent its squadrons. The Air Weather Service emblem in the lower part of the shield indicates that 2d Weather Wing is a part of Air Weather Service. (Approved, 11 Dec 1957)
