EMBLEM



4 Services Squadron emblem: On a blue disc, a yellow horn of plenty shaded brown emitting a yellow key on the left and a white chef's hat below a brown bed with a red spread on the right, overall at top a yellow bugle; all within a narrow yellow border. Attached above the disc a blue scroll bordered yellow inscribed SERVING IS AN HONOR and attached below the disc a blue scroll bordered yellow. SIGNIFICANCE: Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The elements on the shield indicate the mission of the unit and also refer to the unit's motto. The horn of plenty symbolizes the support mission of the unit. These support services include quarters for transient personnel which is represented by the key and the bed. The chef's hat represents dining facilities. The trumpet stands for the funeral ceremonies provided when required. (Approved, 30 Jul 1986)



4th Services Squadron emblem: On a disc as a globe Azure, gridlined and bearing a torch to dexter Or, enflamed forched Gules, garnished in its center with a Yellow lightning bolt and issuing from sinister an American bald eagle volant Proper, its wings increscent Sable, detailed Argent, all within a diminished border Blue. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "4TH SERVICES SQUADRON" in Blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The globe refers to the worldwide scope of the unit's mission. The eagle symbolizes the unit's professionalism, patriotism and discipline. The torch signifies leadership, pride and commitment, while the lightning flash within the flame describes readiness and quick response.
