Serviced aircraft production area containing five factories located near the cities of Chicago, Louisville and Buffalo. Ferried 18 types of aircraft, including P-39, P-40, L-2, B-17 and B-24 to points all over the world but specialized in the North Atlantic and Alaskan routes. Ferried P-39s to Fairbanks, AK where Soviet pilots took delivery.

Became combat ready, 1 Sep 1956

Participated in training and exercises refueling bombers assigned to the 19th Bombardment and other wings. Deployed to Morocco carrying passengers and equipment enroute refueling bombers while returning.

Squadron participated in Operations Long Legs II, the deployment of Thunderbirds aerial demonstration team to South American, 1961

In Jul 1963, squadron maintained seven alert aircraft at Otis and two alert aircraft at RAF Brize Norton and RAF Fairfield in the United Kingdom.
