EMBLEM





On a blue disc, a white Pegasus detailed silver grey, supporting on his back between his wings, a green sphere gridlined blue all within a narrow yellow border. Above the disc a blank blue scroll bordered yellow and below a blue scroll bordered yellow inscribed WE CAN MOVE THE WORLD in yellow letters. SIGNIFICANCE Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky the primary theater of operations for the Air Force. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. Pegasus, mythical creature of winged strength, symbolizes rapid unit mobility. The globe signifies the worldwide capabilities of the unit. The globe also refers to the Squadron 's motto.
