MISSION

The 31st Logistics Readiness Squadron delivers and sustains combat logistics readiness support through professional vehicle, supply and fuels management. The unit plans and executes surface, rail, air and sea movement of passengers and cargo for the 31st Fighter Wing, Geographically Separated Units (GSU) and US and NATO deployed forces. The 31 LRS executes base deployment operations while maintaining a robust capability to deploy personnel/cargo in support of AEF.

More than 449 active-duty, Reserve and Civilian employees are assigned to the Logistics Readiness Squadron. The squadron is responsible for over 1200 vehicles valued at over \$58M, stock accounts valued at over \$521M, and the receipt, storage, quality and issue of over 42M gallons of fuel and cryogenics products annually. The unit manages 618 Unit Type Codes tasking 4,370 personnel and 1,942 short tons of cargo and maintains a War Reserve Materiel program valued at \$1.5M. The 31 LRS also operates the wing's Support Agreement office, maintaining more than 20 support agreements with \$25M in reimbursements annually.

The 31 LRS consists of seven separate flights covering Fuels Management, Material Management, Vehicle Operations, Vehicle Maintenance, Readiness, Management and Systems, and Traffic Management.

EMBLEM



31st Supply Squadron emblem

per bend nebule line extending from dexter chief to sinister base on the disc. An or lightning bolt issuing from sinister chief and extends to sinister base. An argent centurion's helmet, adorned with a gules plume is mounted over all. The disc is bordered with ultramarine azure. An argent scroll is attached above and below the disc the scrolls are bordered also with ultramarine azure. The scroll above is blank. The one below is lettered with ultramarine azure and bears the unit's motto, "above all else". **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and air force yellow are used in the design. Blue represents the sky, the primary theater of air force operations. Yellow symbolizes the sun and the excellence required of air force personnel. The lightning bolt represents the speed, flexibility and ultimate deadliness with which the squadron may accomplish its mission the silver centurion's helmet depicts the warrior, and the unit's primary mission of support to the combat units the red plume denotes the warrior's courage and the lifeblood provided by the unit to support combat operations the motto expresses the unit's dedication to providing each and every one of its customers with the best possible supply support (Approved, 16 Nov 1994)
