31st Air Base Group emblem

31st Mission Support Group emblem: Per bend nebule Or and Azure, in chief a Wyvern Light Blue, sans legs, endorsed of the second, all within a diminished bordure of the first. Attached below the shield, a White scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border inscribed "31ST MISSION SUPPORT GROUP" in Blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The nebule dividing the field symbolizes clouds, the area of the unit's operations. The legless Wyvern represents strength and ferociousness in the air when faced with the enemy.
