# **OPERATIONS**

Organized at Stewart Air Force Base in December, 1949, the 32nd began operations on the morning of February 21, 1950. This was the era of temporary radar equipment rushed out of mothballs to construct a stop-gap air defense in a tense world situation. Only two aircraft control and warning squadrons and their detachments were then operating temporary radars through the sector. The arrangement at Stewart was also temporary, for Stewart was in the area of the 26th Air Division, and the 32d was then in a position of controlling its resources from outside its own area. It was not until February, 1952, that the Division moved to its present headquarters at the Syracuse Air Force Station. By this time the permanent radar stations had grown in number to eight.

Air Defense is a cooperative venture, its very success depends upon teamwork of a high order. Added to the products of the ever-rotating radars are the data from the human eyes and ears of the Ground Observer Corps, which seek to plug the gaps in the radar screen. These are correlated with flight plans filed with air movements identification sections of the Civil Aeronautics Authority. When aircraft remain unknown the fighter-interceptors spring into the air—just in case. All of these actions are supervised by the Division air control center which portrays a total picture of tactical activity. The net result is a smoothly efficient mechanism, ever alert to its heavy responsibilities in air defense of the continent.
