On a blue disc edged with a narrow black border a sword with blade to base in pale (pale and guard white, hilt and pommel red, all details black) emitting from its hilt two yellow lightning bolts chevron wise to base between in the upper portion of the disc a silhouetted red Scales of Justice in dexter and a silhouetted red stylized sentry in sinister and in the lower portion of the disc a red scroll garnished yellow above a red ink bottle and pen in dexter base and a red silhouetted head of a dog in profile, couped at the neck and eyed black in sinister base. The Sword with Lightning Bolts is indicative of the squadron Motto, "Ready To Serve Anytime Anywhere",

and denotes Strength, Defense, and Unity of the Squadron working together towards the ultimate mission objective, Justive, Peace, and Freedom. The colors red, white and blue are symbolic of the colors of our flag and represent valor, purity and vigilance. The Golden Yellow is the official Air Force colr which indicates the Sun, and the excellence required of Air Force Personnel.

OPERATIONS

Capt Garth Wright was assigned as the Weapons System Security Officer, 35th Security Police Squadron. On 26 January 1969, at 0032 hours a reported base perimeter breach was confirmed when a firefight began. Captain Wright and six additional Security Policemen were directed to reinforce the perimeter sentries and attempt to flank the enemy. While sweeping toward the perimeter breach, Captain Wright engaged enemy personnel, killing one man who was discovered to have a grenade in his hand and sacks of grenades tied around his waist. At the end of the engagement, sixteen enemy personnel were dead and one wounded prisoner was taken. Credited with extraordinary coolness under fire and preventing —hostile forces from overrunning the base, Captain Garth Wright became the second Security Policeman to be awarded the Air Force Cross.
