MISSION

The 36th Intelligence Squadron provides tactical target materials, special targeting and weaponeering analysis, and tailored digital data bases to support U.S. Air Force weapons systems, mission planning and aircrew training. The squadron also provides focused and tailored intelligence to meet the specific requirements of Air Force units preparing for deployment, while they are deploying, and during the time they are deployed.

The 36th is organized into four flights:

Digital Materials Intelligence Applications Targeting/Recognition Materials Requirements Management

The Digital Materials Flight provides accurate digital maps, charts, elevation data, detailed geocoded imagery and other digital products supporting automated mission planning needs and unique requirements for advanced weapon systems. It serves as the Air Force's sole producer of multi-spectral imagery.

The Intelligence Applications Flight supports combat air forces, training units, the NAIC and AIA staffs by producing materials, targeting analysis and specialized target studies.

The Targeting/Recognition Materials Flight produces ad hoc and scheduled general military intelligence to support exercise, training and combat operations of the Air Force and other Department of Defense aircrew members the same type of target materials they will be using in operational conditions as well as producing prototype target materials for future and developmental weapon systems.

The Requirements Management Flight assigns and tracks all ad hoc and scheduled production requirements. They also submit, track and monitor associated all-source intelligence collections.
