36 MUNITIONS SQUADRON



MISSION

The 190 dedicated professionals of the 36 MUNS provide the power behind Airpower. The munitions squadron stores, inspects, maintains and accounts for the largest munitions stockpile in Pacific Air Forces and assembles and delivers these munitions to deployed combat aircraft during wartime or contingency operations. The munitions squadron also maintains the largest conventional air-launched cruise missile (CALCM) stockpile in the Air Force as well as providing world-class weapons release system support. 36 MUNS is responsible for a huge storage area spanning over 5500 acres and encompassing 143 storage facilities, 7 operating locations, 23 sited storage revetments, and 160 unsited revetments.

The Material Flight is entrusted with the health of Andersen's stockpile which is valued in excess of \$560 million. They ensure proper storage practices are utilized, perform periodic inspections and ensure accountability of over 97,000 individual items.

The Systems Flight exercises control over all activities that occur within the munitions arena. They direct all daily operations, emergency response and ensure proper combat support. The flight is also responsible for managing all training activities in the squadron. This includes upgrade training, ancillary training, and augmentee training.

The Production Flight provides assembly and delivery capability of all munitions types employed from Andersen. They maintain assembly proficiency for over 30 types of bombs, missiles and countermeasures. They also maintain munitions handling trailers and associated handling equipment.

The Weapons Flight is charged with maintaining the largest CALCM stockpile in the Air Force. They perform periodic inspections and testing, field level modifications and repair as necessary. The flight also maintains all bomber and fighter weapons release equipment and alternate mission equipment for all aircraft deploying to Andersen.


