OPERATIONS

The 44 Bombardment Wing's subordinate units attacked enemy airfields in France, Belgium, and Holland between Dec 1943 and Feb 1944. Beginning in Mar 1944, they bombed railroad and highway bridges, oil tanks, and missile sites in preparation for the invasion of Normandy. Its subordinate units supported the Allied offensive at Caen, France, and the breakthrough at St. Lo, France, in Jul 1944. Between Oct and Dec 1944, they bombed bridges, road junctions, and ordnance depots in support of the assault on the Siegfried Line. On 16 Dec 1944, during a period of poor flying weather, the Germans launched a major offensive, known as the Battle of the Bulge, in the Ardennes Forest. When the weather cleared, 44 wing units bombed supply points, communication centers, bridges, marshalling yards, roads, and oil storage tanks. The 44 activated in the Reserve from 26 Jun 1947-27 Jun 1949 and became an Air Division in Apr 1948.
