The emblem is symbolic of the group, and the Air Force colors, golden yellow and ultramarine

blue, are used. The radar unit denotes the far reaching communications capability of the organization and the lightning bolts represent a swift reaction in all situations. OPERATIONS

In July, the 47th CG began installing and training on the first systems of the \$1.6 billion Cheyenne Mountain upgrade program. Replacement of existing communications and computer hardware will continue through 1996. Throughout this upgrade, 47th CG personnel will be intimately involved with every phase.

The unit has received many major awards and recognition during its history, including eight outstanding unit citations. In addition, the cryptomaintenance work center received the Top Gun award from Space Communications Division for the second year in a row in 1989, and the Technical Control Facility was recognized by the Defense Communications Agency as the best transmission media facility for the Western Hemisphere in 1989.
