EMBLEM

On a disc ultramarine blue, charged with heavy storm cloud formations of light and dark gray green in chief, border light red, a silhouette, stylized C-47 aircraft black, highlighted light yellow, flying in front of two yellow orange lightning flashes in pile, and emitting white speed lines to rear, as per record drawing. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The insignia depicts a standard C-47 airplane continuing valiantly on its mission despite weather conditions or any other possible hazard. It also portrays the vigorous, undaunted spirit of the I Troop Carrier Command.

Under provisions of paragraph 3, AR 900-3, 19 May 1958, (the 77 TCS) requests that the inclosed insignia be approved for the 77th Troop Carrier Squadron, Medium (Reserve), Donaldson Air Force Base, S.C. The presently authorized insignia, attached, was officially adopted in 1944. This insignia is not applicable to the present unit mission as it possibly did when first adopted. Neither does the insignia seem to conform to all the requirements of AFR 900-3. Example: The present design definitely portrays the C-47 type aircraft, which was utilized by the 435th Wing including the 77th Troop Carrier Squadron at that time. Sub paragraph (2)(b) of paragraph 4b to APR 900-3 states that the design must not "Portray specific types of aircraft or equipment in the over-all design composition". The proposed insignia pictures the tiger, the ready striking force of Reserve Troop Carrier unit. The sack on the tiger's back signifies the troop carrier transport capability. The overall insignia is patterned after the Fourteenth Air Force tiger under whose administration the 77th Troop Carrier Squadron operates. The two arcs of 7 stars each surrounding the basic insignia are arranged to denote the 77th. The motto

of the organization placed below the insignia and separate from it is "The Totin' Tigers". The identification of the unit insignia is in the area above the insignia and separate from it.



On a green disc within a wide white border edged green, the Fourteenth Air Force's "Flying Tiger," a winged Bengal tiger. Air Force golden yellow with black and white markings, a knapsack attached by straps to a belt around his waist, all white, outlines black; all between fourteen white stars arched, seven in dexter, seven in sinister. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The emblem is symbolic of the squadron and its mission. The tiger is patterned after the tiger on the emblem of the Fourteenth Air Force, to indicate that this unit operates under its administration and has ready striking force capability. The sack which the tiger carries represents the troop carrier transport mission. The two arcs of seven stars each, indicate this unit's numerical designation, "77th (Approved, 4 May 1960)



On a disc Vert a winged Bengal tiger Or, detailed Sable and packed parachute Argent, armed the same, langued Gules, between seven mullets arcing to dexter and seven mullets arcing to sinister of the fourth; all within a narrow Black border. Attached above the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "THE TOTIN' TIGERS" in Black letters. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "77 AIR

REFUELING SQ" in Black letters. **SIGNIFICANCE**: Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The flying tiger and the fourteen stars are symbolic to the pattern of the Fourteenth Air Force. The parachute represents the troop carrier transport mission. (Approved, 15 Mar 2021)

OPERATIONS

Participated in airborne assaults on Normandy, Holland, and Germany; transported personnel and cargo, and evacuated casualties in ETO during World War II. Supported occupation forces and evacuated Allied troops who had been prisoners of war. Trained for and flew airlift missions in the Reserve for most of the period, 1947-1972, including airlift to Southeast Asia during the Vietnam conflict. Since Oct 1985, flew air refueling and air transport missions as needed worldwide, taking part in many contingency and humanitarian operations, including air refueling support during the U.S. incursion into Panama, Dec 1989-Jan 1990 and the Persian Gulf War in 1991.

Deployed five times to participate in Operation Southern Watch over Iraq. 1993
