# **OPERATIONS**

Prepared for overseas deployment, Sep-Oct 1952. Trained to meet rescue requirements in southeastern Europe; conducted search missions, overwater coverage for fighter movement and emergency air evacuation of ill and injured personnel, Nov 1952-Jul 1953.

3 Feb 53 During floods in the Netherlands, 12 aircraft (SA-16s, H-19s, C-47s, and C-82s) of the 66th, 68th, 69th, 82d, and 83d AR Squadrons flew 198 sorties, evacuating 161 persons and delivering 32,900 pounds of relief supplies.

The 12th Air Rescue and Recovery Service Group stationed the 81st, 82d and 83d ARRS Squadrons at Bordeaux-Merignac from 1952 to 1955. These squadrons operated SA-16 amphibians and H-19B air rescue helicopters. They practiced pilot recoveries at Lake Cazaux near Arcachon. The lake was ideal for water rescue training during the summer months.

1 Jul 1953, ceased to function; all personnel transferred to 81 Air Rescue Squadron.
