

EMBLEM



Over and through a disc red, bordure white, a charging thoroughbred horse of white, with head held high, mane and tail flowing, left foreleg raised in pawing position. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The 87th Bombardment Squadron originated in Kentucky, home of fine thoroughbred horses. The charging thoroughbred is symbolic of the ideals and mission of the squadron in that it is noted for its fine performance, stamina, fighting heart, and faithfulness. The head held high and foreleg in striking position signify the lofty ideals and striking power of the unit. The flowing mane tail are so separated as to form eight points and seven points respectively, portraying graphically the squadron designation, "87." (Approved, 26 Aug 1942)

# **OPERATIONS**

Antisubmarine patrols, Apr-May 1942. Operational training unit, Jan-Oct 1943; replacement training unit, Oct 1943-Apr 1944.

The two newly created launch squadrons at Sembach, the 823rd TMS and the 887th TMS, joined the existing 822nd TMS, which allowed one squadron per launch site instead of the 822nd trying to supply crews to all three launch sites. The original 822nd was assigned to Combat Flight A, Site 1, at Mehlingen; the newly activated 823rd took on Combat Flight B, Site II, at Enkenbach; and the newly activated 887th assumed control at Griinstadt, Combat Flight C, later known as Site III.
