EMBLEM



97th Observation Squadron emblem: On a yellow disc within a red border the implements of observation aviation (radio ear phones, a pair of binoculars, a radio set, aerial camera, two microphones), all in black and white, so arranged to suggest a skeleton. (Approved, 19 Oct 1936)





6949th ESS emblem

97th Intelligence Squadron emblem: On a disc Or, within an annulet Gules, the implements of observation aviation (radio ear phones, a pair of binoculars, a radio set, aerial camera and two microphones), all Argent, detailed Sable, arranged as to suggest a skeleton, all within a narrow border Red. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Red border and inscribed "97TH INTELLIGENCE SQ" in Red letters. **SIGNIFICANCE**: Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. Yellow and red are the colors of the historic 97th Observation Squadron. The design symbolizes the basic purpose of observation aviation-- to observe, record and report with deadly effect. (Approved, 3 Aug 1982)

Maintained and repaired aircraft, 1917-1918.

20 August 1917, Kelly Field, Texas. This barren airfield saw the birth of what was to become one of the finest intelligence units ever formed. On this day, the 97th Aero Squadron was brought into being and was an active participant in two World Wars until it was finally disbanded in 1943.

Antisubmarine patrols, 18 Dec 1941-Sep 1942; trained, and supported ground forces on maneuvers, Sep 1942-Apr 1944.

It is fitting that the heart and soul of ESC's airborne program is in the heartland of the country, Omaha, Neb. The 6949th ESS at Offutt AFB in Omaha is proud to carry the banner "Home of ESC Airborne Operations."

Formed in 1965, the mission of the 6949th is extremely diverse, and whether it's command, control and communications countermeasures, special operations or communications maintenance of all of ESC's airborne equipment, the more than 300 officers and airmen of the Fighting '49th live up to their motto and "Handle It."

The 6949th has a history of strong showing in Offutt intramural sports competition, winning the commander's trophy twice in the last three years. The unit has been awarded the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award with two oak-leaf clusters, also winning the 1986 Maintenance Effectiveness Award for category I units.
