## EMBLEM

On a disc Or, a cross couped Gules fimbriated Sable, surmounted by a sword point to base, bladed Argent shaded Silver Gray, hilted of the third, winged fesswise of the fifth and entwined with a serpent facing sinister Azure, all between six Black stars arced in base three and three, all within a narrow border Black. Attached above the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "GLADIUS EA MEDICAMEN" in Black letters. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "99TH AEROSPACE MEDICINE SQ" in Black letters. SIGNIFICANCE: Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The red cross represents the medical profession and is the international symbol of medical care. The rod of Aesculapius-like symbol further indicates the intent to provide excellent medical service. The six stars symbolize the mission and function of the unit.
