Nicknamed the Wizards, they operate the 33's entire industrial, manufacturing and electronic repair capabilities. Providing both on and off station equipment maintenance, the 33 Maintenance Squadron is committed to preparing the wing's F-15 for worldwide deployment and air superiority employment operations.

EMBLEM



Gules, a globe Azure gridlined Argent surmounted by a sword bendwise in dexter base Sable and below three flight symbols bendwise in pale each issuing a double contrail arcing to sinister chief of the globe Or; all within a diminished bordure White. Attached above the disc a Blue scroll edged

with a narrow White border. Attached below the disc a Blue scroll edged with a narrow White border and inscribed "TEAMWORK PRIDE" in White letters. **SIGNIFICANCE**: Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The red disk stands for teamwork and valor of the unit personnel. The globe reflects the squadron's commitment to global reach. The sword represents the unit's parent wing and represents truth and our ability to project global power. The three stylized aircraft represent the flying squadrons the squadron supports through maintenance service. (Approved, 15 Nov 1994)

OPERATIONS

The 33 Maintenance Squadron, nicknamed the "Wizards" first called Eglin Air Force Base, Florida home in 1965. The wing was flying the F-4 and the Vietnam War was just gearing up. At the time, the maintenance program was divided into four squadrons, the 33 Organization Maintenance Squadron, the 33 Armament and Electronic Maintenance Squadron, the 33 Munitions Maintenance Squadron and the 33 Field Maintenance Squadron.

In 1978, when the 33 received its first F-15, the Air Force adopted a new concept of operating its maintenance programs. Named the Production Oriented Maintenance Organization (POMO), the new concept combined the duties of the four original squadrons into two new squadrons - the 33 Equipment Maintenance Squadron (EMS) and the 33 Component Repair Squadron (CRS). The new squadrons were formed with the single goal, enabling the 33 to fly, fight and win. In December of 1991, the Air Force went through another service wide restructuring. The 33 EMS and the 33 CRS were combined forming the 33 Maintenance Squadron (33 MXS).
