54 School Squadron emblem On a blue disc a lamp of knowledge with the frame in the form of a

sinister wing, displayed within a border, all gold. (Approved, 10 Oct 1931)



554 Reconnaissance Squadron



54 Airlift Flight emblem On a disc Azure, between a pair of stylized wings elevated Argent, in chief within an annulet of the second, a mullet of the last bearing a torteau and in base a lamp Or, enflamed Gules; all within a narrow border Black. Attached above the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "GENERAL DELIVERY" in Black letters. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "54 AIRLIFT SQUADRON" in Black letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The lamp symbolizes knowledge and its rising flame suggests the applied science of flight. Together, they represent the unit's involvement in daily airlift missions. The U.S. aviation symbol reflects the unit's pride in its past and its devotion to maintaining the peace in the future. (Approved, Nov 1993)

554 Reconnaissance Squadron The 554 flew the Beech QU-22B aircraft from NKP from approximately Dec. 70 to Sep 72. Known as the Vampires, the QU-22Bs orbited near the Ho Chi Minh Trail, picking up signals from acoustic sensors and relaying them to the Task Force Alpha facility at NKP.

Provided airlift services for Air University personnel, 1993-1996.

From 1993-1996, rotated two pilots per year to C-21 aircraft units in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia; flew mission supporting classified material, cargo, medical evacuation, distinguished visitors and courier operations. Conducted operational support, aeromedical and training missions from 1997-2006.

The C-21A operational support airlift (OSA) units dispersed in 1993 as part of the objective wing reorganization. But they were reconsolidated under the 375th Airlift Wing again in 1997. Some fleet reductions occurred over the years, but in 2007, a particularly significant recapitalization initiative reduced the wing's remaining 50 C-21As down to just 20 aircraft. Though some capability was lost, some capability was also gained through the activation of the 54 Airlift Squadron under the 375th, as an active associate unit to support flying the C-40C aircraft of the 932nd Airlift Wing (AFRC). On 1 Oct 2009, additional capability was added with the arrival of the 906th Air Refueling Squadron, as a 375th active associate unit to support flying KC-135R aircraft of the 126th Air Refueling Wing, Illinois Air National Guard. Subsequently, the 375th Airlift Wing was redesignated as the 375th Air Mobility Wing.
