EMBLEM

77 Air Base Wing emblem

77 Aeronautical Systems Wing: Or, a broad-winged hawk volant Proper, radiating from behind its head seven flashes Gules, issuant from base a mountain range of seven peaks Azure, all within a diminished bordure of the first. Attached below the shield, a White scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "77 AERONAUTICAL SYSTEMS WING" in Blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The flying hawk represents swiftness and decisiveness, its alertness emphasized by the flashes from behind its head. The mountains in the background represent the Sierra Nevada mountain range. The Wing's numerical designation is indicated by the seven flashes emitting from behind the hawk's head and from the seven peaks in the background. (Approved, 28 Feb 1943 and

slightly modified, 15 Jun 1994; replaced emblem approved, 15 Jun 1955)

OPERATIONS

Supported ground units in training by flying reconnaissance, artillery adjustment, fighter, and bomber missions, and in the process trained reconnaissance personnel who later served overseas. One squadron flew antisubmarine patrols over the Gulf of Mexico from Mar until Jun 1942 when it was relieved by another squadron. Still another squadron patrolled the Mexican border, Mar–Jul 1942. A detachment of the 77 served in India from Feb until Jul 1943.

Provided services and support for McClellan AFB with its satellite installations and the Sacramento Air Logistics Center with its tenant organizations, 1 Aug 1953.

Provided services and support for McClellan AFB with its satellite installations and the Sacramento Air Logistics Center and its tenant organizations, Aug 1953-Jul 2001.

Although the Sacramento Air Logistics Center has most of the people on base and clearly has the largest role operating the business of the depot, it is still just a tenant at McClellan. The actual responsibility for running the base as host falls to the commander, 77 Air Base Wing, and his staff: a considerable task, since McClellan is the Air Force's seventh largest base.

The 77 ABW consists of three groups, a logistics directorate, a flight operations support squadron, and key staff offices. It has over 2000 military and civilian personnel and a \$62 million operating budget (FY96). The wing provides security and law enforcement, transportation, airfield management, depot and base level supply support, services activities, a consolidated command post, and upkeep for over 800 base facilities. The wing commander also has responsibility for civilian and military personnel offices, the communications squadron, social actions, chaplain's office, the aviation museum, the base's readiness exercise program, and more.
